Secrets of the Seas

For thousands of years, humans have travelled to new places across the seas. Now, there are lots of secrets lurking beneath the waves. It is thought that there are up to three million sunken ships at the bottom of the world's oceans!

Many shipwrecks have been hidden for hundreds of years and are still waiting to be found.

Famous Shipwrecks



Queen Anne's Revenge

Queen Anne's Revenge was a British warship. The boat was called Concord until it was captured by a famous pirate called Blackbeard in 1717. Blackbeard gave the ship a new name and used it on his pirate quests.

One year after he captured it, Blackbeard sank the ship near the USA in 1718. It secretly stayed underneath the waves until it was found in 1996. So far, 31 cannons and lots of treasure have been found onboard!

This is a picture of Blackbeard drawn in 1736. Queen Anne's Revenge can be seen sailing in the background.







RMS Titanic

The 'unsinkable' RMS Titanic hit an iceberg on its first voyage in 1912. In less than three hours, it sank to the bottom of the Atlantic Ocean.

It wasn't until 1985 that explorers were able to reach the shipwreck. They found out that the boat had split in half! Some of the boat is very damaged but some of it is still intact. Hundreds of items, such as plates and menus, have been brought back to the surface.

H.L. Hunley

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A submarine called the H.L. Hunley is the only vessel known to have sunk three times! It first sank when it was tested in August 1863. After it had been found and fixed, it sank again two months later in October 1863. It was fixed again but sank for a third time in February 1864.

This time, the submarine was not found until 1995. It had been under the water for 131 years!





San Jose

In 1708, a Spanish ship called the San Jose sank while it was carrying gold, silver and jewels. Nobody knew what had happened to it for 307 years until it was found in 2015 near Colombia in South America. The people who found the shipwreck are still trying to explore it to find out how many of the coins and gemstones are still onboard.

Weird and Wonderful

When shipwrecks are found, they are often damaged. Normally, the salty waves and the creatures that live under the water break the ship up and wash it away over hundreds of years.

Yet, this does not seem to happen in the Black Sea. The Black Sea is a very special place because the water:

- is salty at the bottom;
- is fresh at the top;
- moves very slowly;
- is low in oxygen at the bottom.

Lots of creatures cannot live in the Black Sea. This means that the creatures do not eat the wood that old ships were made out of.

In 2016, 40 shipwrecks were found at the bottom of the Black Sea. Some of them had been there for over 1,000 years but they looked as if they had sunk only days ago!
